

Drive-by Racism Sparks Local Protest In Colfax

The protest organized and held in downtown Colfax on June 10th was simple in its intention: to support the Black Lives Matter protesters in our town who in the previous week were littered with racist, anti-black, white supremacist stickers from a car window.

The outpouring of support, presence, and community was remarkable. After just three days to spread the word, 180 people came and spent their afternoon showing that most of Colfax will not tolerate and will not be silenced by hate. Rural and small towns are not exempt from the events and dialogue unfolding in our country.

Lack of diversity is not a ticket out of the hard work we all have to do to elevate our understanding of humanity, of our own privileges, of the systems that suppress some and not others, and how we contribute to that. There is no just excuse: Get involved, learn everything you can, turn an open eye towards injustice, and mobilize your community to correct it.


Colfax Soroptimist Club Officer Installation For 2020



Council Passes First Reading Of Amended Cannabis Ordinance

At a special meeting on July 1, 2020, the Colfax City Council unanimously approved several changes to the city's existing commercial cannabis ordinance. The special meeting was continued from the regular meeting that was held on June 24. A second reading of the amended ordinance will occur during the council's July 8 meeting.

Changes made to Chapter 5.32 of the Colfax Municipal Code (CMC) included:

- **1.** The maximum number of permissible retail licenses will be reduced to one medicinal retail cannabis license, including microbusinesses with a medicinal retail cannabis component.
- **2.** A total of 10 licenses will be authorized with two allocated for each of the following activities: commercial cannabis cultivation, distribution, manufacturing, microbusiness and testing, reserving discretion to shift one of those licenses between the five categories. Regulations for each of these categories have been included in the draft ordinance.
- **3.** Commercial cannabis cultivation will be allowed and regulated, but outdoor commercial cannabis cultivation is prohibited.
- **4.** Manufacturing activities that are allowed will not be allowed to use volatile solvents.
- **5.** Commercial cultivation and manufacturing facilities that discharge into the City's sewer system will be required to obtain an industrial wastewater

permit.

6. Provisions for suspension and revocation of cannabis permits and monitoring commercial cannabis activities will be fortified, and all cannabis-related activities will be regulated.

The council also approved two changes to be incorporated into CMC Title 17:

1. Commercial cannabis cultivation, distribution, manufacturing, microbusiness and testing licenses will be conditionally authorized within Retail Commercial (C-R), Highway Commercial (C-H), Light Industrial (I-L) and Heavy Industrial (I-H) zones with the exception of Historic Downtown District overlay within Colfax.

2. The location of allowed cannabis activities will be more closely aligned with state law. Council also committed to recovering the City's cost of establishing and implementing the commercial cannabis regulation program through equitable allocation between licensees. That issue will likely be addressed by separate resolution or ordinance at a future meeting.

At its June 24 meeting the council unanimously approved the amended contract with the Placer County Sheriff's Office for policing services in 2020-2021. The amended contract includes a 6.15% increase in overall cost to the city, raising the contract value to \$781,616.



COVID Restrictions Prompt More Local Sales For Colfax Farm

After visiting Colfax a couple times while courting his wife, Bryanna, who was born and raised here, Steven Eisenhut was hooked. "This place was just magnificent and after going down to the river I knew this was where we'd be coming to start our farm."

That was fine with Bryanna. She just couldn't believe the property at the end of Alpine Way that they'd found on the Web even existed. "I went to high school here. When we saw it online, I didn't believe it would look like this because it's so flat," she said. "I was astounded when we first saw it. It's really incredible how the pieces fell into place."

Asked about the farm's name, she said 'Stone's Throw' was on the early list of possible names and that it "just kept sticking around. We eventually settled on it because it elicits how close we are to the city, the trains, and all of the things we like to do like river rafting, skiing, and hiking foothill trails, all while being close to family and community."

Over the last four years they settled into a routine of daily farm work and regular deliveries of fresh, organic produce to farmers' markets and local restaurants. They also became parents and are raising their two children, Casper and Matilda.

The still-developing farm was making a steady income producing vegetables and cut flowers as the Eisenhuts continued looking for ways to expand when COVID-19 scourge closed them and all of their markets down.

They'd already cut back on farmers' markets to have more time as a family before the lockdown began. But they were making two large deliveries a week to Three Forks, their main restaurant customer in Nevada City.

"Three Forks was taking everything we grew, but after the virus lockdown, the deliveries dropped to five pounds of this and a couple of bunches of that because they were impacted too," She said. "I was in full panic, because it was scary."

Suddenly stuck with loads of organic produce and no place to sell it, they started their own online shop selling vegetable boxes. After attending a number of Webinars on everything from food handling safety to field crew sanitation measures, they opened a pay-as-you-go weekly vegetable box for on-farm pickup each Wednesday.

"The response was awesome. We sold 15 boxes

the first week, and it's grown from there largely by word of mouth. We've never really marketed it yet," she said. "It felt really cool having people come here because they were increasing their own safety and ours too."

They're now selling 20-40 boxes a week and have just acquired some CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) software to increase marketing options for themselves and their customers. CSA customers subscribe for a full season of locally grown produce by paying the farmer up front for weekly vegetable boxes.

They've also increased their deliveries of bagged salad mix to Briarpatch Co-op in Grass Valley. She said that selling bagged salad mix has become a special niche for Stone's Throw because not many farms grow for that market.

"And our being organic makes it even more marketable," she said. "We've also begun selling it to the Sacramento Natural Foods Co-op. At both places the demand for locally grown produce has

greatly increased. It makes sense because it's way safer and more reliable during a time when the virus might interrupt supply from more distant farms."

She noted that other farmers have also had to adjust their business models to generate more local sales. "In the farming community we're wondering if the virus has started a local food revolution, because it's starting to look like it has."


