City Council Returns To Holding In-Person Meetings

With social-distanced seating, the Colfax City Council returned to live, in-person meetings in July. Zoom/call-in options are still available.

The July 14 meeting opened with a presentation from the Placer Mosquito Vector Control District explaining the district's mission of managing the risks from insect borne diseases to "protect public health and quality of life in Placer County." District manager Joel Buettner and district public information officer Meagan Luevano made the presentation.

A public hearing to amend Colfax Municipal Code Chapter 2.28 to allow the city to provide for its volunteer fire department and related services by contract agreement with the county followed that, and passed unanimously.

A resolution authorizing the city manager to sign a three-year contract for building inspection services, not to exceed \$355,453 also received a

unanimous approval vote by the council.

During Council and Staff reports city manager Wes Heathcock introduced Martin Jones, the city's new public works director. Jones, who has been on the job since June 7, lives in Grass Valley and was previously employed as superintendent of parks and general services for the city of Davis, California.

The July 28 meeting was called to order with council member Mendoza absent.

The meeting opened with a presentation by city planning director Emmanuel Ursu, recommending adoption by resolution of an addendum to the General Plan environmental Impact Report, as well as the 2021-2009 Housing Element Update of the General Plan. After a lengthy council question and answer session the resolution passed unanimously.

Council members Mendoza and Burruss were appointed as the Colfax representatives to the working group.

The city council's next meeting is scheduled for August 11, 2021.

Placer County COVID Updates

As of June 30:

- A total of 398,194 doses have been administered to Placer County residents, including 192,808 second or complete (i.e. single dose) doses. Public Health receives vaccine allocations on a weekly basis and uses some doses for its own operations while reallocating others to health care partners including hospitals, clinics and pharmacies.

- There were 23,793 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Placer County as of July 1. Cases have continued to decrease in the last month.

- Placer County has received reports of 300 COVID-related deaths.

- * 158(53%) were residents of long-term care facilities.

- * 43% were under the age of 80; 12% were under the age of 65.

- * At least 91% of those who died had at least one confirmed underlying health condition.

As of July 1:

- Placer County Public Health has received 452,890 total test results to detect COVID-19. The 7-day average testing positivity rate is 2.6%.

Delta Variant: Placer County Public Health has been notified of 6 cases of the Delta variant identified through genomic surveillance. The Delta variant is associated with increased transmission.

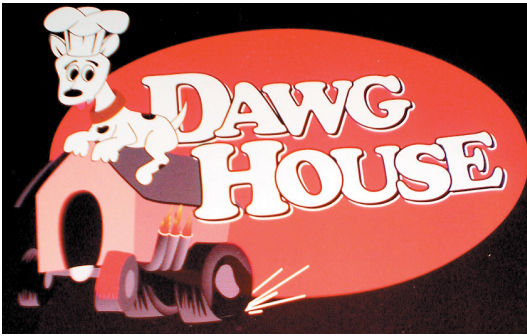

Recently we spent some time with new owner Doug Keenum, who just left the business banking world. How do you go from banking to being a chef and owning a restaurant? Doug said he was getting burned out in banking, and he always liked to cook. So, why not. As of now, he has owned the restaurant for four months.

Doug wanted me to make this point: The menu may look the same but “some of the components are different.” That’s because the menu reflects Doug’s own spin on the items. For example, the Philly Cheese Steak features melted provolone, none of that goeey, “cheese” stuff that many places use.

Some of the dawg items have intriguing names: “57 Chevy Dog,” “Mustang Dog,” “Chal-

lenger Dog” and “Harley Dog.” And, there are lots more. Of course, there are drinks, like sodas, beer and ciders.

Speciality items are Tri-Tip Sandwiches on Tuesdays and Fish ‘N’ Chips on Fridays. Also, there are two veggie options with more to come.

Now, for a different kind of libation: **The Railhead Saloon**, 30 N. Main, in

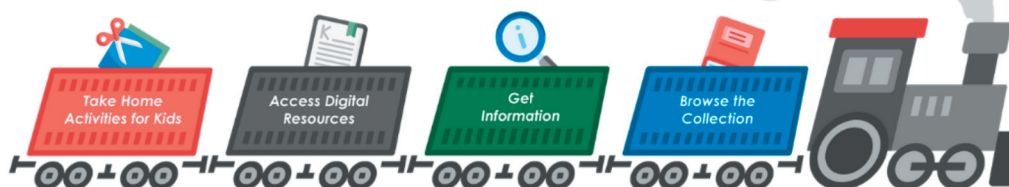
