

Council Amends Parking, Election Sign Ordinances

Whether or not to restrict parking on narrow city streets was the city council's sole piece of official business at its August 24 meeting. Mayor Pro Tem Mendoza was absent.

The sheriff and council members have received a number of complaints that vehicles parked on narrow streets impede the passage of emergency, utility and sanitation vehicles. Recology, the city's solid waste hauler, has apparently been unable to access some streets for refuse collection.

The parking issue was initially discussed at the August 10, 2022, regular City Council meeting. Staff was directed to propose language that could be added to Colfax Municipal Code ("CMC")

Chapter 10.16 to allow the City Engineer, with prior Council approval, to post signs restricting or prohibiting parking on narrow streets within City

limits, and to consider whether an amendment to CMC Chapter 10.16 is needed to accomplish that result.

Staff complied, and after brief discussion and a minor edit the council passed the first reading of the following amendment to the city municipal code on a 4-0 vote:

The City Engineer, with prior approval of the City Council, is hereby authorized to place signs or markings indicating restricted or no parking upon

any street when the width of the roadway does not exceed 20 feet, or upon one side of a street as indicated by such signs or markings when the width of the roadway does not exceed 30 feet. When official signs or markings restricting or prohibiting parking are erected upon narrow streets as authorized in this section, no persons shall park a vehicle upon any such street in violation of any such sign or marking.

There will be a second reading of the ordinance amendment at the September 14 council meeting, and it will take effect 30 days later if passed. "It's going to be complaint driven," said city manager Wes Heathcock. He said before any signs go up residents will have the opportunity to give input to the council. "We will be going on a case by case basis, and not making arbitrary decisions," he said.

Earlier in the meeting the council also amended the Colfax Municipal Code pertaining to posting of election signs. The city's current ordinance forbids posting election campaign signs sooner than 60 days before an election, a prohibition

When asked how she felt to be back at Colfax High School after working at other high schools within the district, she replied, "I feel blessed and I am very excited to be back here in the Colfax community."


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now considered to be unconstitutional.

The proposed amendment deletes that restriction. The amended ordinance will allow election campaign signs to be posted more than 60 days before an election, but still requires that signs to be removed no later than 21 days after an election. The council unanimously passed the first reading of the proposed amendment. The second reading will occur at the council's September 14 meeting.


The District is encouraging community members to explore vacancies as substitute custodians, paraprofessionals and campus supervisors.

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Student Essay: How Do Trees Help The Environment?

(Editor's note: In our April 2022 issue we featured the seven winners of the Colfax Garden Club's annual 5th Grade Arbor Day Essay Contest planting a tree. Starting with its May issue, Colfax Connections is sharing those essays with its readers. Jack Saul was one of two third place winners.

Do you like sweet, delicious pears? Then you love trees! Trees help the environment by protecting it, as well as giving people and animals the necessities they need.

First, trees protect the environment. Trees can help prevent floods. When heavy rainfall starts, the rain can hit the tree and then slowly drip back down, causing the flood to form slower.

Trees can remove carbon dioxide from the air. In one year, a single tree can remove up to 48 pounds of carbon dioxide and give back oxygen into the atmosphere.

Most of the biodiversity is from trees. A single tree can be home to hundreds of different living things from other plants to insects, birds and mammals.

Then when a tree is cut down or dies the trunk will still be a home to many organisms while the lumber is used to make homes for humans.


Trees provide homes to more than 80 percent of Earth's terrestrial biodiversity. Without trees, the world would be an unpleasant place to live.

Second, trees provide people with many necessities. Trees give people and animals fruit, and I love pears. A mature pear tree can produce about 100-300 pounds of fruit in a single year. About 20 percent of mammal herbivores eat mainly fruit.

Trees also give us paper. An av-

erage tree can make more than 10,000 sheets of paper and I am a bookworm. Without trees, I wouldn't be able to enjoy pears or read my favorite books. Trees not only protect the earth, but they also provide people with many foods, including fruits.

I hope this Arbor day we can all do as Julius Morton would have wanted and properly plant millions of new trees.
