

Mosquito Fire Was Largest In Placer County's History

The meeting opened with a consent calendar listing nine items, including rental charges, city equipment repair, sewer plant improvements and monitoring, an increase in city employee life insurance benefits, and the cash summary and quarterly sales tax analysis. All council members were present and approved the consent calendar with a unanimous vote.

Following agency reports the council heard a Mosquito Fire Incident Overview presentation from Placer County Fire Department/CALFIRE Chief Brian Estes. He opened his presentation saying, "The Mosquito Fire was the largest wildfire in Placer County history." He added that before the fire was finally extinguished, it had burned 76,788 acres, 22 structures, and had run suppression costs up to \$160 million.

Asked about the cause of the fire Estes would only say that the fire started "in and around" a structure at Oxbow Dam, and that the exact cause was still under investigation. He said the fire that started in Dutch Flat at roughly the same time had been held to 50 acres by an aggressive air attack, and had been started by burning truck brakes on I-80.

There were three items of council business:

Items 9A and 9B, resolutions respectively authorizing the city manager to execute a lease agreement with Astound Broadband for the northwest corner of 33 W. Church St., and expanding the Pioneer Energy Joint Power Authority to include the cities of Grass Valley and Nevada City as voting members both passed unanimously with little discussion.

The last item of business, 9C, was a pavement management plan update that offered two options involving contracting with Coastland Engineering for \$25,240 or \$15,800 depending on which option the council preferred.

CHP Officer Chris Nave is Retiring

Chris Nave has had the life experiences that many of us envy. Star athlete in high school, sports scholarship/academic student at Cal State and 26 years of exemplary community service as a California Highway Patrol (CHP) officer equals a special individual who cares a great deal about his community.

As an avid high school sports fan, I have known

Chris since he was an underclassman at Colfax High School. It is fun to see a young person excel in any sport. It is truly enjoyable to see that person take on leadership positions so that their teammates can celebrate their own athletic accomplishments.

As quarterback on the football team, Chris' leadership and prowess led to awards of All-League and All-Metro. As an All-League point guard and team captain, Chris led the Falcon's basketball team to many victories. As a pitcher and first baseman for the baseball team, Chris received All-Metro recognitions and a sports/ academic scholarship to CSUS where he received his BA and MA in criminal justice.

The selection of criminal justice as an ultimate career was no off-the-cuff decision. Family history certainly leaned heavily on Chris' next steps. Grandfather Nave served as an officer with the Los Angeles Police Department and the Placer County Sheriff Department. Grandfather Libolt served as a military policeman in the U.S. Army. Colfax High coaches, Dick Adams and Buck Wheat. who were also CHP officers at the Gold Run Office, certainly gave Chris many a pep talk on the reasons why CHP would be a great career choice.

After completing his college studies, Chris became an officer serving at the Sacramento County Probation Department. Then came the acceptance to be an officer in the CHP. After his appointment and training

period, Chris served 10 years in the offices of Redwood City, Dublin and Vallejo. While the Gold Run office is small and the number of officer vacancies there are also small, Chris was successful in receiving a transfer to that office. To say that he was more than happy to return to his native Placer County is an understatement.

Chris served as a regular patrol officer at Gold Run until 2013. At that point, he was seeking more regular hours in order to spend more time with his grow-

ing children and their many activities. Having coached many different sports before his CHP appointment, Chris also wished to get back into coaching.

Enter a new title of CHP Community Information Officer. If there was a need for a Gold Run CHP press liaison, Chris was your contact. I recall seeing Chris many times on Sacramento television news stations giving information on weather, road closures, accidents or


whatever a reporter was searching for at the time. I also recall Chris as a fine teacher, as I attended his class sessions on vehicle safety that were specifically designed to help seniors. I learned a lot.

Chris has been married to his wife Kristin for 27 years, and the couple has two children. Daughter Aubrey is a student at Arizona State and son Bradley is a junior at Colfax High. Asked about his next steps, Chris replied "I enjoy serving the community. I see coaching and any related teaching as an immediate goal that is very different from law enforcement. I am always up for a new adventure and excited for what comes next. I have no regrets and love how my career has progressed over the years."

Lt. Frank Newman, Commander at the Gold Run CHP Office had high praise for Nave: "I met Chris almost 25 years ago when we were both CHP officers assigned to the Redwood City Area. I've always known him to be an officer of extremely high work ethic and integrity.

"Throughout his career, he has been a friend and mentor to all. He always remained firm and fair in his enforcement of the law while showing great compassion to the citizens we serve. He has taken a great interest in our local community as a coach and mentor to our youth. In his 25 years of dedicated service, he has received multiple awards and commendations. In short, he is one of the most dedicated and professional officers I have had the pleasure to work with."

directly for details.



But after public works director Martin Jones explained the two alternatives further, Mayor Trinity Burruss kicked off the council discussion saying she'd prefer having the next street survey done initially by city staff rather than spending money for a consultant.


Councilmember Fatula joined the mayor saying that a street survey "wasn't rocket science" and that he could put together a survey based on Internet research. He and the mayor even volunteered to walk the streets taking pictures of needed repairs.

Eventually the council decided to kick the item back to staff to come up with a third, 'in-house' street repair option, and asked that it be brought back at the council's December 14 meeting.

The council meeting scheduled for October 12 was cancelled.

Garden Club Favors Native Plants To Beautify Downtown Colfax

If you have been in downtown Colfax recently, you probably noticed that the Colfax Garden Club planted flowerbeds at the corner of Main Street and Grass Valley Street and at the corner of Main Street and Church Street are in full bloom.


What you may not have noticed is that the plants growing in the flowerbeds are mostly California native plants. The currently profusely blooming red, pink and orange plants are California fuchsias (Epilobium canum) that really love the full sun they receive almost all day long.

The lemon-yellow flowers growing are moon-shine yarrow (Achillea moonshine), and the plants with small white blossoms are Santa Barbara daisies (Erigeron karvinskianus). Other plants are also well suited for our area, although not native California, are a variety of lavender, like French lavender (Lavandula dentata), Spanish (Lavandula stoechas), English lavender (Lavandula angustifolia), and a variety of sedums.
