

## City Council Approves Union Pacific Easement Agreement

Ever since 2019, when the city council determined that paving Railroad Street all the way to Whitcomb Avenue was a key to improving downtown access, city staff has been working with Union Pacific (UP) to grant an easement for the project.


In late 2022 UP granted the easement, with a price tag of \$412,500. City staff successfully whittled that down to \$154,688 and at the February 8 city council meeting asked the council to approve purchasing the easement for that amount, which the council did with a unanimous vote.

The next step will be negotiating costs for improvements to the rail spur crossing that exists just before Railroad St. drops down to Whitcomb Ave. behind Mar-Val Sierra Market.

The item was passed on a 4-0 vote. Mayor Pro Tem Marnie Mendoza was absent from the February 8 meeting.

the expiration of the Governor's (COVID) state of emergency on February 28 that has allowed the council to meet remotely for the last two years.

The council voted unanimously to resume in-person meetings in the city hall council chambers.

## **Council Shows No Interest In Allowing Recreational Cannabis**

When Colfax voters were asked if the city should allow recreational cannabis sales on the 2016 election ballot (Measure H), the answer was a resounding "Yes," passing with nearly 64 percent of the 805 votes cast locally.

That same question returned to the city council February 22 agenda, and 19 of 22 people who went to the public podium to speak on the issue said "No." It was unclear if all of those opposed were city residents.

The three people who spoke in favor of allowing recreational cannabis sales were all connected to the Golden State Patient Care (GSPC) medical cannabis retail operation here in town.

Members of the Dion family that owns and operates GSPC have been appearing regularly at the public podium claiming that the city's cannabis ordinance was not in compliance with state law.

At the January 25, 2023, regular meeting, the council directed city staff to review the city's Commercial Cannabis Activity ordinance (Colfax Municipal Code ["CMC"] Chapter 5.32) for legal compliance.

Staff retained SCI, the author of the city's ordinance, to conduct a review.



SCI's analysis confirmed that the ordinance complies with state law and regulations, with no changes required. City attorney Mick Cabral said because of that determination, any changes to the ordinance would have to be based on policy direction from council.

Cabral said the council had three options to consider:

• Take no action and allow CMC Chapter 5.32 to remain intact.

• Direct staff to present proposed changes to the ordinance based on Council policy direction.

• Direct staff to present an amendment that will

repeal Chapter 5.32 and outlaw all cannabis sales in Colfax. There were no questions from the council regarding the analysis.

Mayor Trinity Burruss opened the public discussion by announcing that the public comment period would by open for 30 minutes, with speakers having one minute to express their opinions.

She explained that she wanted people to be able to speak, but was concerned about the large winter storm moving into the area and getting people home and off the roads before it arrived.

When the comment period was closed, and the following council discussion produced no new ideas regarding changes to the existing ordinance, Burruss declared the item closed.

She adjourned the meeting at 7:00pm.


Earlier in the meeting the council voted 4-0 to purchase a pair of Portable Changeable Message Signs for use during emergency situations.

Mayor Pro Tem Mendoza did not attend the meeting.

Purchasing the signs came out of the after-action-strategy session that followed the post-Christmas blizzard of 2021 that temporarily paralyzed Colfax with 16 inches of heavy wet snow.

The city will spend \$35,920 for the two signs, which includes tax and freight charges.




## FACT SHEET

#### INTERSTATE 80 BLUE CANYON PAVEMENT REHABILITATION

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION:**

Caltrans proposes to improve the safety, reliability, and freight mobility of Interstate 80 (I-80) in Placer County at three locations from east of Crother Road to Nayak Road. Proposed improvements include a truck-climbing lane and pavement rehabilitation on eastbound I-80. To accommodate the truck-climbing lanes, the roadway will be widened and two structures, the Blue Canyon undercrossing (UC) (Br.#19-0115R) and Weimar overcrossing (OC) (Br#19-0082), will be replaced with wider structures. The project also will improve drainage systems, address inadequate roadside lighting, upgrade the median barrier, improve Traffic Management System (TMS) elements in the eastbound direction, and construct a wildlife crossing box culvert.



#### PURPOSE:

The purpose of the project is to preserve and extend the useful life of the existing pavement and drainage systems, improve safety, reliability, and freight mobility of this mountainous segment of I-80. The additional pavement width will improve safety and operations by facilitating movement around slow-moving vehicles and trucks whose speeds drop due to sustained grade. Safety will also be improved by upgrading signs and TMS systems to the latest standards, by replacing outdated barrier and metal beam guardrail, and by addressing wildlife crossing conflicts.

#### NEED:

The existing pavement is exhibiting signs of distress and will continue to deteriorate without action. Culverts within the project limits have also been in a steady deteriorating condition requiring rehabilitation and/or replacement to prevent further damage to the existing roadbed. Signs, lighting, and TMS elements are in poor condition along this segment of the roadway. Numerous collisions resulting from wildlife crossings were also reported along the roadway. Traffic within the project limits is subject to substantial delays from heavy truck traffic on the mainline, resulting in rear-end collisions, loss in level of service, and decreased operational efficiency of this corridor.


