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Hillberg And McCully Appointed To Colfax City Council

The June 28 council meeting was the last of three council meetings in June, one of the busiest months the Colfax City Council has had for some time. It was also the most important meeting of the month because the council had to choose and appoint two new council members to fill the vacancies created after Marnie Mendoza and David Ackerman each resigned their seats recently for personal reasons.

The meeting also had a closed session scheduled to discuss hiring a new city manager following the departure of Wes Heathcock on June 9, but that was scrubbed from the agenda without explanation on a unanimous 3-0 vote immediately after the meeting started.

Five of seven applicants for the two vacant seats were on hand to be publicly interviewed, answering questions that asked why they wanted to join the council, their view of the city's top priorities, describing their vision for Colfax, anticipated conflicts of interest or time constraints they might have, and whether they expected to run for a full term in 2024 after serving out their 18-month appointment.

Public comment was allowed before and after the interview process. Mayor Trinity Burruss

called for a five minute recess when the interviews were completed, and when the meeting resumed, the applicant pool was quickly narrowed down to Suzanne Roberts, Larry Hillberg and Caroline McCully, who were present. After a brief discussion among council members, Hillberg and McCully were declared the winners after they both received 2-1 votes of

approval.

Earlier in the meeting the council addressed a request by Green Machine for \$13,500 to pay for the July 3rd celebration, which included \$12,500 for the fireworks and \$1,000 for general costs. Mayor Burruss reminded everyone that the city had set aside a \$20,000 fund for July

**CAL FIRE Suspends Burn Permits in
Nevada, Yuba, Placer and Sierra Counties**



Auburn- After a wet winter and above average snowpack, warming temperatures and winds are quickly drying out the abundant annual grass crop. The increasing fire danger posed by the high volume of dead grass and hotter, drier conditions in the region is prompting CAL FIRE to suspend all burn permits for outdoor residential burning within the State Responsibility Area of Nevada, Yuba, Placer and Sierra Counties. This suspension takes effect Monday, June 26, 2023, at 8am. and bans all residential outdoor burning of landscape debris such as branches and leaves.

Since January 1, 2023, CAL FIRE and firefighters across the state have already responded to over 1,640 wildfires burning over 4,200 acres. While outdoor burning of landscape debris by homeowners is no longer allowed, CAL FIRE is asking residents to take that extra time to ensure that they are prepared for wildfires by maintaining a minimum of 100 feet of Defensible Space around every home and buildings on their property and being prepared to evacuate if the time comes.

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3rd and Winterfest fireworks. She also suggested that the city pay for the fireworks but not the general costs, and the council agreed with a 3-0 vote.

June 14 Meeting

The meeting began with Mayor Burruss confirming that David Ackerman had resigned his council seat, leaving the council with two vacancies to fill. By state law the council has to fill his seat by appointment no later

than August 13, and Mendoza's no later than July 4.

The council passed a self-storage project for Whitcomb Ave. with 334 units after some discussion regarding drain water encroachment on neighboring property and potential solutions. The mayor expressed concerns regarding the shade of red paint on the finished project.

Short term rentals (STRs) were back on the 6/14 meeting agenda, this time as proposed

city ordinance that would regulate STR activity. The proposed ordinance suggested offering a maximum of five licenses in the city to start with. Mayor Burruss said she thought the proposed ordinance was too restrictive and suggested holding a public workshop to discuss and make possible changes.

with a closed session regarding finding a new city manager. Using the Consent Calendar, the Council unanimously passed a three-year contract with the Placer County Sheriff’s Office for \$2,919,296, with the annual payments split roughly equally over the 2023/24 – 2026 time period.

Mayor Burruss and council members Douglass and Lomen were present.

There were two items of Council Business. The first asked for approval of rewarding two contracts for \$8.1 million to improve the city’s sewer collection system and treatment plant.


The second dealt with hiring Michael Luken as interim city manager, to work three days a week, starting June 28. Luken has 35 years in land use planning, economic development, city/county management and recently retired as the Executive Director of Placer County Transportation Planning Agency.

Both items passed unanimously.

The council also formed an ad hoc committee of Burruss and Douglass to fill the city manager void until Luken starts. Mayor Burruss volunteered to temporarily take on city manager duties and responsibilities until Luken is sworn in.

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


