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Council Agrees To Allow GSPC To Sell Adult-Use Cannabis

The Dion family, owners of Golden State Patient Care, the city's medical cannabis retail operation, has been appearing at the public podium pursuing the right to also sell adult-use cannabis for years. Their persistence finally paid off at the council's July 26 meeting.

Whether or not to grant GSPC an adult-use license was the last item on the council's July 26 agenda. The item was posed as a discussion to consider making potential changes to the existing cannabis ordinance, with council to give staff guidance and direction when all was said

and done.

When the discussion was over, after nearly 90 minutes of public and council comments, three council members agreed with the Dions and directed city staff to amend the ordinance to give GSPC the right to sell to medical and adult-use customers. Councilmembers Douglass and Lomen were opposed. During the public comment 28 members of the public spoke at the podium and via e-mail in favor of allowing adult-use cannabis in Colfax.

The only voices opposed were from law enforcement. Placer County Sheriff's Office Sgt.

Griffiths' main complaint was that there is no way for his deputies to quickly test drivers for suspected cannabis impairment. He suggested the council delay making a decision until science could provide a device for accurate roadside testing.

Colfax voters approved permitting medical cannabis by ballot in 2016, when Measure H passed with 64% of the vote.

The agenda briefly outlined three different options for the council to consider: 1) make no changes at all and leave Colfax Municipal Code Chapter 5.32 as is. That chapter is based on

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Ordinance 542, which was adopted July 8, 2020. 2) Direct staff to bring back any proposed changes at a future meeting. Changes could include reducing or increasing the number of permitted licenses, or expanding the permissible license cat-

egories to include adult use and deliveries. 3) Possible changes to fees and charges to cover the city's costs for regulating cannabis businesses.

Earlier in the meeting the council gave a brief update on the request by Shady Glen to join

the Colfax wastewater treatment system. In June the council approved a resolution to begin preparing two state grant applications to fund the consolidation of Shady Glen's waste water system with the city's

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




One option to improve the crosswalk safety would be eliminating two parking stalls adjacent to the crosswalk (shown at left) on the opposite side of the street.

waste water system.

Mayor Burruss said that even with the "significant state funding" that was on the table for such a project, it would likely take three-to-five years to complete and would have to include annexing Shady Glen as part of the project.

July 12 City Council Meeting

Pedestrian safety in the cross-walk on West Grass Valley St. at Culver prompted a lengthy discussion at the July 12 city council meeting. At question was how to improve crosswalk safety without removing any of the street's scarce parking places.


Mayor Burruss said she was "adamantly opposed" to removing any parking spaces.

Dr. Kurtis Fox summarized the problem this way: "It's a safety issue especially for kids on their own, and older people who don't walk so well," he said. He suggested installing stop signs to make cars stop.

Other suggestions included pedestrian activated beacons and a flashing red light. The council handed the issue back to staff with a request for more information before bringing the item back at a future meeting.

It is a vicious cycle: I hear some locals say there is nothing to see, do or buy in downtown Colfax, as they roar through town towards the freeway to who knows where.

"There is nothing for me downtown, so why bother. Businesses open, then businesses close. Businesses are always closing. If I do come downtown, the store or business that I went to last week might not be open any more. A wasted trip.

includes how friendly the staff is.

What else are advantages to shopping in Colfax?

Each dollar spent in Colfax increases its value several times when that local business sponsors local sports teams and gives to local nonprofit organizations to support a fundraising event for that nonprofit and the community. You may have heard that before, but it is still true.

The owners of many local businesses, including those that are franchises, are local residents. They are our neighbors. Their kids know your kids because they go to the same local schools.

Another advantage to shopping locally is that your tax dollars stay in Colfax and help the city provide services for you and your family.

I'm not suggesting that you should never shop down the hill.

What I am suggesting is that before you jump in your car for a shopping trip, check if the item you want to buy can be found in Colfax. And, consider all the advantages to shopping locally in Colfax. That will help local businesses stay open. Thank you.

How Do Trees Help The Environment?

Did you know that tree rings on a tree predict climate change? Trees are also able to defend themselves against attacking bugs.

I love how every season the leaves change color. In spring they are blooming and green. Then in fall they turn orange and red. It is peaceful. Trees help the environment by producing clean oxygen into the air. Trees also provide shelter

and food. Trees are amazing. Trees help the environment by providing oxygen for all living things. But first, trees must go through a process called photosynthesis. 

If you're looking for something a little faster paced, the Veterans Memorial Hall hosts a monthly Bingo to those aged 18 and over on the third Saturday of the month.


The Railhead has periodic live music.





