Revised Cannabis Ordinance Passes First Reading On 4-1 Vote

The first reading of the newly revised cannabis ordinance sailed through on a 4-1 approval vote at the August 23 city council meeting.

The vote followed a short public hearing where fewer people spoke on the issue, but with the usual two-thirds majority in favor of allowing recreational cannabis to be sold in Colfax.

The second reading of the proposed change to the ordinance will occur at the September 13 meeting, followed by another vote.

If passed, the revised ordinance will take effect 30 days after that on October 13.

As explained by city attorney Mick Cabral, only a single word was changed in the ordinance, with 'adult use' replacing the word 'medicinal' based on council direction given at the July 26 council meeting.

Larry Hillberg was the only council member to speak prior to the vote, saying that as long as cannabis was going to be here it was better to have a safe, regulated product from a known local retailer.

Councilmember Kim Douglass was the lone opposition vote. All council members were present at the meeting.

There were two other main items of business on the 8/23 agenda: a review of the draft

updates to the city zoning code as preparation for directing city staff to draft a revised ordinance, and a report by Fred Abbott on the upcoming Railroad Days event on September 16 &17.

City planner Emmanuel Ursu said the proposed changes to the city zoning code would comply with changes to state housing law, reflect updates to the general plan, and generally clean up the code's language and internal inconsistencies.

He spent a part of his report on zoning code changes necessary for compliance with state law regarding accessory dwelling units (ADUs), that can also serve as short term rentals.

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Railroad Days Rolls Back Into Colfax

Colfax celebrates its long railroad history with Railroad Days, a family-oriented, kid friendly weekend.

Colfax Garden Club Wins First Place in Statewide Competition

Many Colfax residents have commented about the colorful flowerbeds at the corner of Main and Grass Valley Streets, and Main and Church Streets.

The City Beautification Committee of the Colfax Garden Club planted the flowerbeds. Members of the City Beautification Committee included Barbara Louden, Annette Choate, Shirley Jacobs, Jeannette Lowery, Caroline Hickson, Linda Hooper, Amy Maehler, Cheryl Hadley, and Eric Hadley. Ingrid Elsel chaired the committee.

The incentive for replanting the previously overgrown and weed-infested area came from the Colfax Area Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. Both organizations have donated funds to the upkeep of the flowerbeds for many years.

Last Spring the City Beautification Committee decided to totally replant the beds. Since this was going to cost more than the funds available through donations, the Colfax Garden Club added money to the effort.

The City Beautification Committee was fortunate

because the City of Colfax Public Works Department offered to do the hard work. Their crew pulled out the existing vegetation, removed all rocks and debris, installed an irrigation system and covered the beds with weed cloth.

The Committee developed a plant pallet of native California plants. Its selection of plants is appropriate for our Sierra Nevada foothill climate, while also taking into consideration anticipated climate changes. We also wanted to demonstrate to the community that native and waterwise plants are good additions to our home gardens.

The results were quite beautiful and the Colfax Garden Club decided to enter the Beautification Project in an awards competition of California Garden Clubs, Inc. We were awarded First Place in the Civic Achievement category by the Pacific Region Garden Clubs, which is comprised of eight western states. We also received First Place from the California Garden Clubs, Inc. in the Civic Development category.

The Colfax Garden Club is very proud of these awards and hopes to expand its City beautification efforts into other plots downtown.

He described four variations of ADUs, as follows:

- Detached from the primary structure (house) on the property.
- Attached to the property's primary structure.
- Converted existing space that is either attached to the primary structure or not.
- Junior ADU (JADU) converted from existing space contained inside a house, and that does not exceed 500 square feet.

Colfax residents thinking about building an accessory dwelling unit on their property should consider downloading the Accessory Dwelling Unit Handbook that was included in the August 23 city council meeting packet.


Ursu concluded his presentation with a summary of the proposed changes to the zoning code that will include changes to clarify development standards, correcting typographical errors, and removing internal consistencies found by staff during the latest code review.

The last piece of business was Fred Abbott's report on Railroad Days, which he warned would be noisy and advised people to take appropriate precautions.

When he finished the council voted unanimously to donate \$2500 to the event, and the meeting adjourned shortly after that.

1911 Cross Country Flight Attempt Ended In Colfax

Did you ever wonder about the metal plaque near the US Bank in Colfax? It commemorates the 1911 flight of Robert Fowler in his attempt to be the first to fly across the country in less than 30 days. Since many people have wondered about that plaque, local historian, Swend Miller presented a recent Historical Society program that answered everyone's questions.

Miller began his remarks with a detailed history of the Wright Brother's early flight experiments and the now famous first powered flight. The Wright Brothers kept improving on the 1903 plane used at Kitty Hawk and by 1911, many of their planes were in use. Long distance flying was now a reality.

Newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst advertised a \$50,000 prize to the first pilot to make it from coast to coast in less than 30 days. The prize was huge and would have been \$1.5 million in today's currency.

Enter Robert Fowler. He received only three hours of flight instruction from Orville Wright, but everyone thought he had sufficient skills to achieve the goal. The Wright Flyer Model B was his craft of choice and everyone was optimistic. The flight path followed the route of the Southern Pacific Railroad.

Leaving Golden Gate Park in San Francisco on September 11, 1911, Fowler crash landed near Alta. The damaged plane was

hauled to the railyards in Colfax for repairs. The entire Colfax and Grass Valley communities pooled their resources and the craft was rebuilt. Fowler was underway within only 10 days! His fuel tank and system was

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unpressurized and the increasing altitude east of Colfax meant the engine could not deal with the altitude. The engine overheated at 6000 feet elevation

and repeated efforts to continue were unsuccessful.


Fowler eventually gave up and the aircraft was sent to his Los Angeles area home. The cash prize was never issued.

Artifacts of the historic flight are now on display at the Colfax Heritage Museum and include a broken piece of the Model B aircraft from the Alta crash and the barometer that Fowler used as a rudimentary altimeter.

Miller's presentation was warmly received by a large group of history enthusiasts. As you might have guessed, Miller's early days were filled with lots of model airplane building.

He also has extensive engineering training and experience in developing systems for the Boeing 747. Given Miller's vast knowledge of historic flight, the audience was hanging on his every word.

From the Wright brother's early experiments to Fowler's attempt to fly crosscountry, Miller took the audience on a delightful and interesting flight from Kitty Hawk to Colfax.
