Burruss Passes Gavel To Douglass, Lomen Becomes Mayor Pro Tem

The city council followed established tradition for the annual rotation of council officers at its December 13 meeting.

Mayor Trinity Burruss gave way to new mayor Kim Douglass, and Sean Lomen was seated as Mayor Pro Tem.

The six-item Consent Calendar passed on a unanimous vote, and included:

- the minutes from the Nov. 29th council meeting,
- the Second Reading of Ordinance 556 that will amend Colfax Municipal Code Title 17-Zoning,
- amending the city salary schedule for the new Administrative Services Officer position,
- the rail tie donation to the Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad & Transportation Museum (see sidebar),
- a contract increase with Management Advisory Services (MAS) from \$50,000 to \$75,000 for additional supplemental planning services,
- and a pump motor rebuild for Lift Station 5 not to exceed \$40,571.

The first meeting in January (1/10/24) was canceled by unanimous vote as interim city manager Mike Luken will be traveling and unable to attend.

The closed session that was also on the 12/13/2023 agenda for the end of the meeting was can-

celed by unanimous vote and the meeting adjourned shortly thereafter.

Narrow Gauge Rail Ties To Be Returned

Twenty five years ago Colfax received a donation of narrow gauge railroad material (rails and ties) from the Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad & Transportation Museum. It was intended for an exhibit at the renovated Colfax Passenger Depot. The rails have been stored at the corporation yard ever since then because the exhibit was

never completed.

The Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad & Transportation Museum now has a use for this material that could benefit the region with another rail exhibit in Nevada City, and has asked for the ties to be donated back. The city council agreed with a unanimous vote.

Former Bear River Campground Given A New Name

The Placer County Board of Supervisors has approved renaming the former Bear River Campground located near Colfax to "Bear River Fishing Access."

The change aligns with the county's latest memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), the current owner of the property, governing management of the recreation area.

Placer County has played an integral role in managing the Bear River property since the 1960s.

Approximately a year ago, in November, the Board of Supervisors authorized the county to enter into a new agreement with CDFW.

The agreement narrowed the county's responsibilities from full management of the Bear River Campground to daily maintenance and ranger patrol duties.

Under the current arrangement, the property permits daily use, but camping is not allowed. "I

commend our Parks Division for their unwavering commitment to engaging with our community and collaborating with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife," said Placer County District 5 Supervisor Cindy Gustafson.

"The Parks team has admirably ensured continued access to this cherished area while prioritizing the protection of our community."

The county is currently operating under a two-year MOU with the state, which is set to expire in February 2025. Although CDFW has not finalized its long-term plan for the property, Placer County remains ready to assist in any capacity necessary.

Placer County Parks Administrator Andy Fisher expressed gratitude for Fish and Wildlife's partnership in managing the site, saying "We appreciate the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's proactive efforts in enhancing vegetation management at Bear River Fishing Access."

Where in Colfax can I get a gourmet sandwich? **Beach Hut Deli** at 555 South Auburn, suite B, across from the Colfax Motel is the place to go.

Their menu is packed with a huge variety of choices in these categories: Gourmet sandwiches, Hot Melted Gourmet sandwiches, the Classics (sandwiches), Breakfast sandwiches, Salads, and Beach Munchies.

Let's look at some selections on the Gourmet

list. The Surfin' Bird includes turkey, avocado, bacon & cream cheese on a French roll with condiments, lettuce, peperoncinis, red onions, cheese and tomatoes.

The Surfin' Cow includes roast beef, avocado, bacon &

cream cheese on a French roll with the condiments & veggies, as above. Plus, provolone is added when hot.

The Hobie includes Pastrami, salami, provolone & Italian dressing with condiments & veggies on a French roll.

Now, some selections from the Hot Melted Gourmet list. The Skinny Dipper includes only these items: roast beef, ground pepper, onions, cheddar & mayo on a toasted French roll with a side of Au lus.

The Pig Kahuna includes these items: Pulled pork, BBQ sauce, Tabasco, cheddar & pineapple on a toasted French roll.

The Sunburn includes only these items: chicken, Buffalo wing sauce, jack cheese, onions, bacon, ranch & lettuce on toasted French roll.

If you want to create your own Classic sandwich, this category is for you. You start with your choice of meat and cheese. I'll choose the tuna & cheese. Then, I can add my choice of breads or lettuce wrap and my selection from a nice list of cheeses. And, we can add these items that come with it: condiments, veggies & peperoncinis.

For the salad lovers like myself, Beach Hut has quite a variety of choices. I'll pick one as an example: the Super Salad. With iceberg or spinach or romaine the main ingredients include quinoa, edamame & vegetable mixture with avocado, onions, tomatoes & feta cheese with lemon vinaigrette dressing.

Beach Munchies sounds intriguing. Let's look at one: Marley Nachos. They are built with toma-

toes, onions, peperoncinis, avocado, bacon & cream cheese

The final category to study is Breakfast sandwiches. The Creek Croissant is a yummy sounding combo: 2 eggs, ham, Swiss, onions, tomatoes & bacon on a



toasted croissant.

I imagine one of these examples has whet your appetite by now. Or I hope so. Maybe later when you get the munchies. You can order by phone, (530) 512-5081 or online, https://beachhutdeli.com/onlineordering.

The hours are 10 to 8 everyday. Prices run from \$6 to \$30 depending on your order.






They have more than 48 staff members including, but not limited to, full medical staff (Doctors, RN, LVN, PA and NP), a clinical team (case manager, therapist, PhD Clinical Psychologist and Psych NP) and more. Restoration Recovery accepts most forms of insurance, and if they are unable to accommodate a patient at one of their facilities, they assist in reaching out to other organizations.

Struggling with addiction can feel isolating,

hopeless, and shame-filled, but Restoration Recovery was established to walk alongside their clients, bringing hope and letting people know that they don't have to walk this path alone.


