## City Council Chooses Digital Billboard Photo, Introduces Sidewalk Ordinance

Mayor Kim Douglass called 2024's last meeting of the Colfax City Council, and his last meeting as mayor, to order on December 11 at exactly 6:00 P.M. All members of the council were present.

He moved the agenda quickly to a 5-0 approval vote on the four-item consent calendar, through the agency reports and on to two public hearings, the first being a sidewalk repair, maintenance and liability ordinance.

The item was presented by city planning consultant Kathy Pease, who described the proposed Municipal Code amendment as clarifying that sidewalk maintenance was the responsibility of property owners whose property abutted city sidewalks.

"Since 1935 California state law (California Streets and High

ways Code Section 5610) has recognized the responsibility of adjacent property owners to maintain and repair sidewalks abutting or crossing their property," said Pease.

She said maintaining sidewalks is important for reducing legal liability, as well as meeting the Americans with Disabilities Act requirements. The ordinance will be complaint driven, and

## NID Closing Scotts Flat, Rollins Lake Boat Ramps

Nevada Irrigation District (NID) is shutting down all of its boat ramps to powered watercraft on Scott's Flat and Rollins Reservoirs until further notice.

The drastic move is being made to protect the lakes and their infrastructure from the invasive golden mussel.

NID is calling it a temporary closure following the recent discovery of the golden mussel at the Port of Stockton in the Sacramento/San Joaquin Delta. The closure will include Long

Ravine, Orchard Springs and Greenhorn at Rollins, as well as the boat launches on the Cascade Shores and Scotts Flat sides.

NID also operates an ongoing aquatic invasive species prevention program to prevent the introduction of quagga and zebra mussels.

after receiving a complaint about a damaged sidewalk, the city will issue a notice to fix the problem within 60 days. If the property owner fails to make the repairs the city will do the work, then lien the owner's property for the cost.

If the property owner can demonstrate that the

repair costs pose a severe financial hardship, Pease said the city could agree to allow the property owner to cover those costs via a payment schedule.

There will also be a protest process that will trigger an investigation by the city, culminating in a fact-finding letter being issued to the property owner. If still not satisfied, the property owner could appeal to the council in a formal hearing.

During the council discussion, councilmember Trinity Burruss asked if the 60-day repair requirement could be extended, and councilmember Sean Lomen suggested making it 90 days. At the end of the council discussion the proposed amendment was sent back to the planning department for changes.

The second public hearing was a review of the annual report on mitigation impact fees charged by the city. With no comment from the public or the council, the report was accepted on a 5-0 vote.

The first piece of official council business dealt with a new promotional photo of downtown Colfax that will go up on the I-80 digital billboard. The Colfax Historic Business Association held a photography contest that received numerous pictures of Colfax from community members.


The tiny foothill town of Iowa Hill lost its unofficial mayor when Cathy Morgan passed on October 18, 2024.

Cathy worked the bar at the Iowa Hill Store when she first moved to Iowa Hill. She used that job to get the community together and discuss ways to improve life at "The Hill." After leaving the bar, she continued to be a community organizer and sponsored "Taco Night" at her own home. It was a potluck dinner held on a weekly schedule that she organized for decades. Of course, there was music, campfires and lots of plans to improve the entire area.

One of her biggest contributions to The Hill was her 25-year tenure as an Instructional Assistant at the Iowa Hill School. A right arm to teacher, Richard Marks, Cathy was devoted to the students and a perfect com-

ing's gym, and the cost of the project, triggered a sewer lateral inspection because it exceeded the \$20,000 limit mandated by City Municipal Code 13.08.520. That brought SVC before the council to ask that the inspection be waived to avoid the additional costs of the permit fee (\$407.00) and the cost of a Closed Circuit Television inspection.

After a brief discussion where possible changes to the ordinance were mentioned, the council voted unanimously to grant SVC's request and waive the sewer lateral inspection.

The meeting's last bit of official business included the swearing in of council members Caroline McCully and Larry Hillberg, and new city attorney Conor Hawkins.

That was followed with annual rotation of council officers, making Sean Lomen the city mayor for 2025, and Caroline McCully the new year's mayor pro tem on unanimous votes.

We at the Chamber are thankful for our com-


munity and all of the support we have seen at the events this last year.




