Sewer Rates Going Up, Council Donates \$10,000 To July 3 Fireworks

Colfax wastewater treatment rates are going up after a majority (4-0) vote in favor at the May 22 city council meeting. Council member Burruss was absent from the meeting.

The council had the option of raising rates by two, three or four percent as was explained again by the consultant in detail before the vote. Each option represents a cap that the city can't exceed without another Prop 218 process. It is allowed to lower rates under the cap, however, which inspired council member Larry Hillberg to close the discussion with a motion to cap rates at 3%, while keeping them at 2% for the next year. The rate will be reviewed each year and set to what is needed up to a 3% maximum yearly increase.

Council member Sean Lomen seconded Hillberg's motion, and the sewer rate issue was done for another five years. The rate raise will take ef-



fect at the start of the new fiscal year in July. In other business the meeting's second public hearing proposed adoption of a short-term rental

The Colfax Soroptimist Club recently held a celebration dinner to present the club's 2024 awards honoring women and girls.

The Violet Richardson Award is named after Violet Richardson, the president of the first Soroptimist Club, which was in Alameda County in 1921.

As a volunteer service organization, Soroptimists believe that by acknowledging a young woman's volunteer service, she will grow up to be an active and contributing adult.

This year's Richardson winner is Anna Reimers. She is a volunteer at Auburn Acres of Hope which is devoted to empowering women and children who are experiencing emotional trauma. Her cash award is earmarked for supporting her fall college adventure.

The Ruby Award is named to honor Ruby Lee Minar, the first Soroptimist Federation President. The award is designed to honor women who have made extraordinary differences in the lives of women and girls. This years' award went to Ellen DeMaria Walker. She is a volunteer counselor at Stand Up Placer, which is devoted to support survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and human trafficking.

The Live Your Dream Award is designed to motivate and support women who provide the primary source of income for their families. In addition, they are very motivated to achieve their goals and have been accepted to, or are currently enrolled in a vocational training program or undergraduate degree program.

The goal of the award is to help women improve their economic

status by preparing them to enter the work force. This year's winner is Melanie Wolley. She is a single mom of two and will be receiving her AA degree in June. Her career goal is to be a nurse. Her cash award will support her college and home expenses.

The Cathie Hunter Award honors a former Soroptimist who was a leader in the Colfax Club, Colfax High School and the Colfax Community at large. She was a creative artist and was a prime mover in establishing the high school's first student computer laboratory. The award is designed to honor a female CHS student who exemplifies Hunter's life contributions.

This year's Hunter award went to Lily Patrick. She has created an actual "Giving Tree" on the Colfax High School campus. The concept is based on the Shel Silverstein book entitled "The Giving Tree." Students are encouraged to leave uplifting and empowering messages attached to the tree. The goal is to provide support to students who are in need of affirmation or support.

Soroptimist Awards chairperson, Cynthia Eisenhut noted, "Soroptimist International of Colfax members were thrilled to present awards of recognition to four local outstanding women and girls. We are delighted to be a part of empowering women and girls to be their very best. This is what Soroptimist International does around the world."

ordinance in a first reading before the council. If approved, the proposed ordinance would allow any single-family dwelling or accessory dwelling located in a residential or commercial zone to be rented on a short-term basis (30 days or less).

A yearly fee still to be determined would be collected. A fee structure mentioned during the council discussion ranged from \$500-\$1500. The ordinance also has a number of provisions to protect neighbors from rowdy renters. The item passed on a 4-0 vote and will return for a second hearing at a June meeting.

The meeting's last public hearing item proposed adoption of a zoning code amendment to the Mixed Use-1 (MU-1) zoning district to permit businesses other than retail in ground floor spaces in the downtown district.

The current MU-1 code requires "ground-floor spaces with street frontage be accessible to the public and that (retail) uses generate walk-in clientele to contribute to the pedestrian experience

along Main Street."

City staff has been contacted by businesses interested in buying or occupying vacant Main Street front spaces, but the current code does not permit any of the proposed uses. The code amendment will allow for more flexibility for vacant commercial spaces in the downtown area. After a brief discussion, the move to approve passed on a 4-0 vote.

Funding for the July 3, 2024 fireworks was the only item of city business. Festivals-of-Cali-805, located near Santa Barbara, is this year's event organizer and asked for a donation of \$5,000 to \$8,000. City manager Ron Walker verified that the General Fund non-profit event fund was down to \$6,399.81.

Council member Lomen suggested the council donate \$10,000, even if it meant making a budget adjustment. After some discussion, he turned that into a motion that council member McCully seconded, and the motion passed 4-0.

City Council Reaffirms Eventual Skate Park's Intended Location

There were two skate park items on the May 8 City Council meeting agenda. In the first one city staff asked the council to consider if the current proposed location for a skate park, next to the Splash pad in Lions Park, is the best site for the project. Or is there a better, alternative location?

After reminding her colleagues that the costs of building the project on the old swimming pool site would be subject to change orders at discovery of any unforeseen conditions, council member Trinity Burruss opened the discussion by suggesting the Lot of Arts on South Main St. as a less expensive, if smaller, backup site for the project. Redesigning the project footprint again for the smaller space would also be required.

Council member Sean Lomen declared that he was against changing the location, receiving support from Ty Connors, a PCSO Sgt. and public front man for the project being sponsored by the



Green Machine. "The existing site is already zoned for recre-

ational uses," Lomen said. "The Lot of Arts is in the city's historical district, is half the size of the current site and will need a variance and environmental studies that will blow out the current timeline of getting started in 2025."

Connors said that moving and redesigning the project would risk losing donors, when the current design and location fit the existing budget. Council member Larry Hillberg reminded his colleagues that they had yet to see a final project design and budget. The discussion ended with the council agreeing to keep the current site.

Mention of the project budget moved the discussion to the second skate park agenda item, that being the proposed agreement with Placer County that would add \$205,000 to the project's funding. The 20-year agreement would require the city to allocate nearly \$400,000 to the project, including fees, grants and donations. All

plans would have to receive county approval, and construction would have to be completed no later than 12/31/2026.

The sticking point for some council members was the agreement's requirement that the city maintain and operate the skate park for 20 years, or reimburse the county on a prorated basis depending on if and when the city terminates the agreement before then.

Three council members wanted to submit an amendment to the county that would soften the agreement's penalty clause for not keeping the skate park open 20 years, if it has to be closed for reasons beyond the city's control. Lomen disagreed, but he was eventually outvoted 3-1. Hillberg had to recuse himself because his property is immediately adjacent to the project site.

The council also approved a new two-year contract not to exceed \$84,897 with the county for animal control services on a 5-0 vote.


involved with the Chamber or any Chamber-related questions.







