

Council Struggles With Outdoor Dining Design

The March 26 council meet-

ing had barely gotten started when council member Trinity Burruss voiced her displeasure that an item she had previously requested be put on the night's agenda was missing.

The item, a city donation of \$1,000 to Colfax High School in recognition of the girls' basketball team's five-year winning record, was placed on the agenda as an urgent item at the meeting's end and passed with a 4-0 vote. Council member Kim Douglass was absent from the meeting.

There were three pieces of official council business on the agenda, starting with another discussion regarding three different cost estimates from City Engineer Carl Moore for upgrading the outdoor dining area on North Main St.

The first included a concrete pad that would raise the dining area to the level of the exist-

ing curb, cost \$112,109.80. The second estimate would use decomposed granite to raise the area to curb level for \$71,137.89, and the third estimate would utilize new fencing, tables and a handicap ramp for \$10,442.00.

City manager Ron Walker suggested making the improvements in separate phases, and the city engineer suggested consulting with a landscape architech for a different perspective. After a lengthy discussion and public comment, including comments that the current dining corral "eyesore" should be taken down, it was decided to keep working on the problem while moving the existing arrangement a little farther north, and giving the city the job of keeping it clean.

Two final pieces of official business each passed on 4-0 votes. The first was approving a petition to rename the area known as the Colfax Ballpark to the

Colfax Girls Basketball ... Another Stellar Season

The Lady Falcons did it once again. In Pioneer Valley League play, they blew out their Division III competitors by huge margins and coasted to another league championship.

Using a "competitive equity" philosophy, the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF), moves schools into divisions of higher school enrollment to prevent "power schools" from continuing lobsided winning records.

Because of their huge wins, the Lady Falcons were moved to Division II to compete with much larger schools in the Sac-Joaquin Section.

Despite the move to Division II, the Falcons continued their dominance. The Section Final was against Ponderosa (Shingle Springs/El Dorado County) and Colfax won by a score of 73-52. Because of their performance at league and section levels, Colfax earned a #3 seeding in the Division II Nor Cal Regional playoffs. An overall win, at this level, moves a team to the state final, always a goal for the Lady Falcons.

Their first Nor Cal game was at home against Clovis East High School from Fresno. Clovis has a student population of 2900 while Colfax's enrollment is 650! A decisive 64-37 win put Colfax in the quarterfinals game against Salesian College Preparatory High School from Richmond. A scrappy game ended in front of another home crowd with a 53-51 loss to Salesian.





The Colfax Girls put together a string of 19 straight victories this season, played their way into the playoffs again, and can be proud of their latest season on the hardwood.

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"Colfax Area Living Veterans War Memorial Park." The last official business item concerned amending the contract with Wood Rogers, the firm preparing two Planning Grant applications for the Shady Glen Sewer Consolidation Project, by \$10,000 to complete the application process.

Earlier in the meeting City planner Kathy Pease gave a 10-minute presentation on the city's Historic Resource Inventory that was mandated by the 2040 General Plan. The Inventory is a list of unprotected historic buildings mostly in the downtown area that merit conservation. She said the Inventory listed 32 structures, two of which – the Freight Depot, and the Passenger Depot – were both listed on the Federal National Register and the California Historic Resources List.

Pease said the Inventory was limited in scope and that additional surveys would be required for the remainder of the city. Even so, the Inventory contains a lot of interesting information, such as this regarding the Colfax Library:

"The Colfax Library is believed to have been started by a group of volunteer women in 1938. The first-known library was housed in a small building next to the home of Mrs. Viscia located on Grass Valley Street.

"In 1943, the library was moved to the old bakery building at the north end of Main Street. The library moved again in 1946 to a small building next door to Kaufmann's Gas Station and Garage. The library remained there until 1951 when it moved next door into the former

telephone company building. The library stayed in this building for 20 years, and then in 1971 it moved to the Justice Building on the comer of Culver Street. Finally, in 1976, the library made its final move to the old Colfax Post Office building (opened in 1855) at the corner of Church and Main streets."

The council accepted and adopted the Inventory with a 4-0 vote.

March 12 council meeting

Former interim city manager Mike Luken led off the March 12 city council meeting with a brief presentation on implementing the Home Hardening and Defensible Space program that he said will be funded by a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hazard mitigation grant. All members of the council were present.

Luken said the program is targeting 137 local residences for defensible space and retrofit measures to increase protection from wildfires. Sixty-three additional residences have been identified for defensible space improvements.

Homeowners participating in the program will also be required to contribute 10% of the cost for the project, with the remaining 90% to be paid by the FEMA grant. The council authorized the city manager to enter a \$2,039,215.00 agreement with 4 Leaf Inc. to manage the three-phase program. Home owners will also be required to maintain the defensible space for 10 years once the program is completed.

Luken was unsure of when the program would start, but said it would likely be next year.

When Luken was finished the consent calendar passed on a 5-0 unanimous vote, including the second reading of the Sidewalk Repair, Maintenance and Liability Ordinance that will now take effect on April 11.

There was second presentation by the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) on the organization's 2025 Blueprint, a 20-year regional transportation and land use planning tool that is updated every four years. The presenter, SACOG's Clint Holtzen, said that Placer County was the fastest growing area in California. He said the agency polled 6,000 residents across the region and discovered that housing affordability was the region's #1 concern, followed by crime and safety, natural disasters, and lack of transportation options.

Holtzen said that SACOG will use the 2025 Blueprint update, expected to be approved by this November, to attract greater investment to the region through grants, private investment, and economic growth.

There were six items of official council business, including: a mid-year operating budget review that passed unanimously, no action was taken on an economic development support budget review, a request by the Sierra Vista Center Community Garden for a \$500 Farm-to-Table dinner event that passed unanimously, and picking Greyson Sharpe as the winner of the second annual digital billboard photography contest.

The meeting closed following a discussion of improvements to the outdoor dining area on North Main St., where the council authorized spending \$15,000 for new fencing and tables. An Ad Hoc committee consisting of Mayor Lomen and Trinity Burruss was formed to continue discussions with staff regarding the outdoor dining area.
