#### Council Passes Budget, Accepts Deal For County Skatepark Funds

At its **June 12 meeting** the city council passed a city budget of slightly more than nine million dollars for fiscal years 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 on a unanimous vote.

A 20-year agreement that would add \$205,000 (\$75,000 from the previous agreement, plus an additional \$130,000) in county funds to the current effort to build a skatepark in Colfax was passed with little discussion on a 4-0 vote. If for whatever reason the city closes the skatepark before the end of the 20-year agreement, it will have to repay the county funds on a prorated basis.

Council member Larry Hillberg was required to recuse himself from the vote as he owns property immediately adjacent to the proposed skatepark site. He was allowed to speak against the project during public comment, however, and took the

opportunity to remind his colleagues that they have yet to see a budget or a design from the skatepark's proponents.

Following the announcement by city attorney Mick Cabral that he would be retiring soon, the council voted 5-0 to appoint council members Burruss and Lomen to an ad hoc committee to find a replacement for him.

There was no new official business before the city council at its **June 24 meeting**.

Two older pieces of official business – the Short-Term Rental Ordinance and the MU-1 Zoning Code Amendment – appeared on the Consent Agenda for a second reading prior to adoption. Both were pulled from the agenda for further discussion and public comment, however, and will be brought back at the July 24 meeting.



Several members of the public appeared to have concerns about city fees for operating a short-rental business, and council member Hillberg wanted to revisit the zoning code amendment that would permit non-retail businesses to move into vacant street level store fronts along Main St.

Also on the Consent Agenda were a six-month extension of the agreement the city has with Bureau Veritas North America for plan review, code enforcement, inspection and permitting services, and a two-year agreement with Management Advisory Services LLC to deal with the day-to-day planning needs of the city.

The remaining items on the Consent Agenda were passed on a on a 4-0 vote. Council member Trinity Burruss was absent from the meeting.

The council also received its annual update from the Placer Mosquito Vector Control District in a 15-minute presentation by Meagan Luevano, the district's Public Information Officer. She said that West Nile virus had yet to be detected in Placer County in 2024, but there had been six human cases including one death in 2023. She also said that the invasive Aedes aegypti mosquito that can transmit the Zika virus had been found in two new locations so far this year in Placer County.

Following brief reports from council and the city manager, the meeting adjourned 55 minutes after the opening gavel.

People have been asking me...

Before I fill you in on the inside scoop of reopened **The Wrecking Crew Bakery & Cafe** (30 N Main), let's answer a question: Why does downtown have two cafes practically next door to each other on North Main Street? "Aren't they similar?" No.

Snapdragon Cafe (38 N Main) is all Organic, gluten-free, Vegan and Vegetarian only. I get asked, "What's the difference?" Vegetarian items use animal products, like eggs and cow's milk, but not the whole animal. The animal is not killed.

Vegan uses nothing from an animal and certainly not the whole killed animal. Plus, all the items for sale are well-marked and fully-itemized.

The Wrecking Crew may have select items that are gluten-free, organic, vegetarian or vegan. So, you see that the two cafes are not the same. If you have more questions, stop in to the cafes and check things out yourself.

Now, on to The Wrecking Crew in its new location, 30 N Main. It is still owned and run by Caroline Glenn Presson with assistance from family members and assistant baker and barista

Some of the new items on The Wrecking Crew menu are Biscuits & Gravy, waffles, Italian sodas, cold brew, and salads. Other items include Buffalo Chicken, more types of sandwiches and wraps, bagel bombs, scones, and some gluten-free options.

Daily specials are posted on the A-frame sign out front.

If you have concerns about the young children working in the cafe, the ones who are old enough for a work permit have one and have taken the county-sponsored food handling course. So, they can prepare your lattes and espressos.

The younger children are permitted only to work the register and take your money.

The new days and hours

for The Wrecking Crew are Monday through Saturday, 7-4. The business cell phone remains 530-537-5085.

The "grand prizes" were Kindle Electronic Readers provided by the Colfax Lions Club's Literacy Project.



Colfax Lions Club Literacy Chair, Alan Shuttleworth said, "Chicago Park School goes far beyond the extra mile in supporting student Reading skills."






