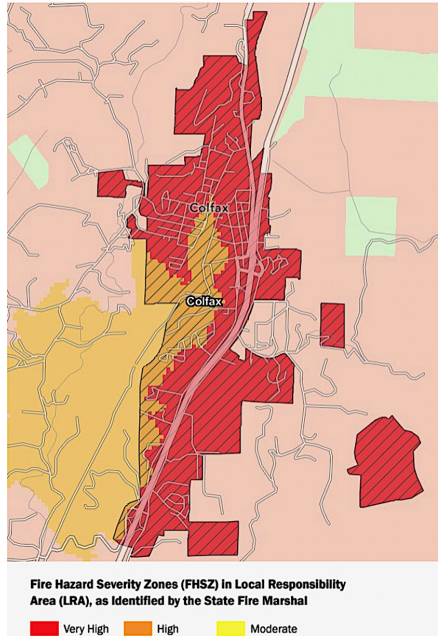
Temporary Outdoor Dining Corrals Proliferating On N. Main St.

After opening on time at 6:00 p.m. the April 23 city council meeting was essentially finished by 6:30, but ran longer due to continued public questioning regarding the establishment of a second outdoor dining corral on N. Main Street in front of the Wrecking Crew Bakery.

As with the April 9th meeting, the main concern was the loss of eight parking places on N. Main St. and the potential impacts on other businesses on the street. And, as with the previous meeting, the only answer those questions received was "It's only temporary" until the city finishes plans for revitalizing N. Main with permanent changes.

After approving the four-item



consent calendar on a 4-0 vote (council member Trinity Burruss was absent) and moving quickly through agency reports, the council opened a public hearing to approve an ordinance amendment to adopt the state fire marshal's Fire Hazard Sever-

ity Zone (FHSZ) map for Colfax. That map shows the entire city is in a high-to-very high Fire Hazard Severity Zone.

The map was promulgated in February 2025 and will not make substantial changes to fire safety requirements for local property owners. The city already has an ordinance mandating hazardous vegetation abatement, and establishment of defensible space in its Municipal Health and Safety Code. After brief discussion and no public comment, the public hearing closed with a 4-0 vote in favor of adopting the amendment.

The night's final piece of business involved approving an agreement with TTJ Consulting to provide financial services preparing and maintaining the city's financial records. The item passed without discussion on a 4-0 vote.

The discussion about the second dining corral began after mayor Sean Lomen opened the floor

for public comment on the final Good of the Order agenda item, and kept going until the meeting adjourned at 7:00 p.m.

ance of a second outdoor dining corral in front of the Wrecking Crew Bakery. It was the subject of the final piece of council business as a discuss-and-direct-staff item.

Council member Caroline McCully was recused from her council seat due to a conflict of interest, and council member Trinity Burruss was absent.

Sheri Peterson ended her public comment in favor of the second corral with, "Give it a chance." Council member McCully seconded that in her own public comment. There were complaints from other businesses about loss of parking, the lack of handicapped parking, and inadequate signage directing traffic to parking behind the freight building.

In the end, the three remaining council members agreed to send the outdoor dining corrals issue back to the Lomen/Burruss ad hoc committee.

In other official business, the council appointed two primary representatives to the Bianchini Fund Committee, and approved a proclamation declaring April 2025 to be Arts, Culture and Creativity Month in Colfax.

Business Briefs with Lindalou Haines

Sierra Animal Wellness Center (SAWC) is a Colfax veterinary clinic that specializes in Integrative Medicine, which in this case incorporates Western and Traditional Chinese Veterinary Medicine (TCVM) practices. Dr. Peggy Roberts, DVM is the veterinarian, who uses all these tools for the treatment of your small animal, most notably cats and dogs.

Until recently the Center has been located on S. Canyon Way next to Dine N Dash. They recently moved into a bigger building at 333A Canyon Court in the DC Solar headquarters building. SAWC has the whole downstairs, while DC Solar uses the top floor. To further identify its location, turn at the Valero gas station on N. Canyon Way and look for Todd's Colfax Smog and Auto Repair on the left. SAWC is in the big white building next door.

Dr. Peggy has worked as a vet for 42 years, after graduating from UC-Davis. She has incorporated TCVM into her practice for 22 years.

TCVM works at the cellular level in the body and can involve use of aquapuncture, herbs and acupuncture. Essentially, TCVM seeks to balance out the disharmonies causing symptoms within the body. Veterinarians who practice TCVM examine your pet using both Eastern and Western methods. That gives the vet a fuller picture of how to treat your pet.

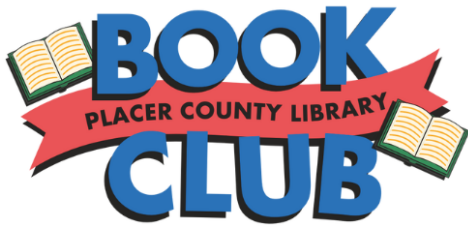

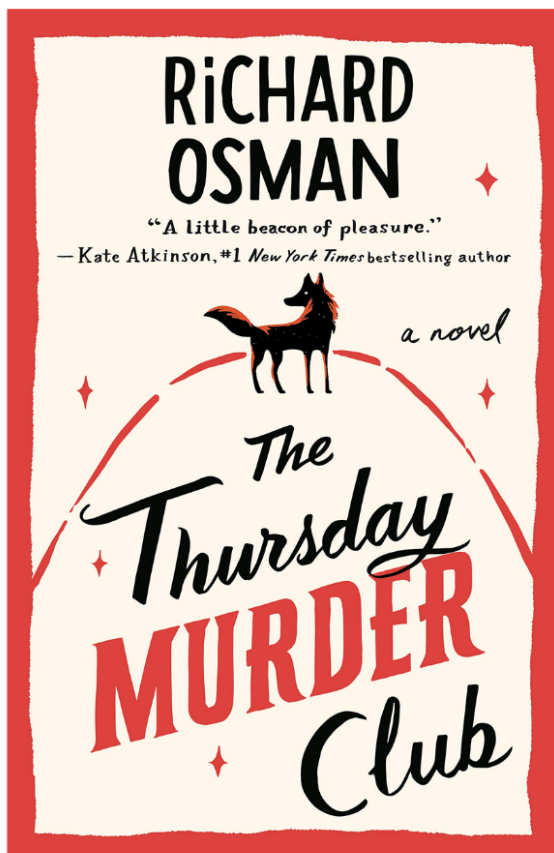
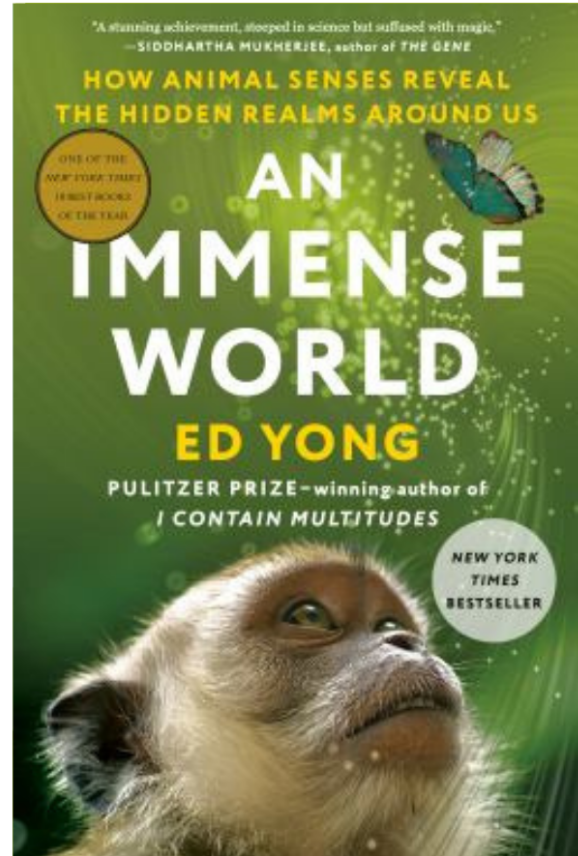
