Council Accepts New Skate Park Design, Rejects 'USA' Resolution



The city council had just started working through its October 23 meeting agenda when council member Larry Hillberg asked to move item 9B – the United Sovereign America (USA) resolution – to just after public comment. He made the request, granted by his colleagues, to accommodate a brief presentation by a Placer County election department official on local election rules and procedures.

Among the points he touched on were:

- Voter citizenship is verified by the state.
- Voting machines are tested and certified by the state.
- Signatures are verified before mail-in envelopes are opened and ballots are removed.
- Random hand-counts are compared to machine counts.
- Unregistered people do not get ballots.

The USA resolution called on "our Representatives" to conduct the 2024 general election in accordance with "existing laws and equitable principles of law." The resolution was first presented to the council at its October 4 meeting, when its supporters asked that it be placed on the October 23 agenda for discussion. City staff reviewed the proposed resolution before it was placed on the October 23 agenda and



recommended taking no action saying,"We do not recommend adopting resolutions of dubious veracity," after being unable to verify the resolution's supporting documentation and many 'factual' assertions.

The council followed that recommendation, but then assigned council member Sean Lomen to draft a similar resolution based more closely on local elections rather than the state and national elections the USA resolution was attempting

to address.

The meeting's last item of official business was a skate park project update that included the first look at the down-sized redesign. Ty Conners said the redesign was necessary due to budget limitations, and suggested that the new design would cost an estimated \$550,000.

A representative for Newline Skate Designs described the new design as "well rounded," adding that it "incorporated all of the elements local skaters had specified. He said it would accommodate all wheels, including skateboards, bikes and wheelchairs.

Connors said the project would be going out to bid in the spring and would be built by summer. Nine speakers were heard from during public comment, with

eight in favor of the new design and one against. Council member Larry Hillberg was not allowed to vote on the item because his house is 50 feet from the proposed site for the project. He was allowed to speak as a member of the public however, and questioned the level of support in the community considering the bulk of the project funding was public money and contractor donations of time and material.

Hillberg also reminded the council that a mitigation meeting that he's been promised was still to be scheduled, and said he will hold them to that promise.

When Mayor Kim Douglass closed the discussion and called the question, the new design was accepted on a 4-0 vote, with Hillberg recused. The meeting adjourned shortly thereafter.

The October 9 city council meeting was called to order seven minutes late due to technical

difficulties. Council member Trinity Burruss was not at the meeting. During agency reports Placer County Sheriff Office Sgt. Kevin Griffiths announced that he had been promoted to Lieutenant and would be leaving his position as lead officer at the Colfax substation after his replacement was named.

During public comment five members of 'United Sovereign America' presented a draft resolution to the council they said would ensure "fair, honest and valid elections." They asked that the resolution be placed on the council's next meeting agenda to be discussed and voted on. During the 'good of the order' item at the end of the meeting council member Sean Lomen requested putting the 'USA resolution' on the October 23 meeting agenda.

The meeting's sole piece of council business was the first reading of a proposed ordinance establishing an administrative remedies procedure for challenges to fees, charges, and assessments.

If adopted the ordinance would:



- **1.** Make the proposed fee, charge, or assessment publicly available at least 45 days before the deadline for submitting written objections;
- **2.** Post a written basis for the proposed fee, charge, or assessment on the City's website;
- **3.** Mail the written basis for the proposed fee, charge, or assessment to ratepayers or property owners upon request;
- **4.** Provide at least 45 days for ratepayers or property owners to submit written objections to the fee, charge, or assessment;
- **5.** Respond in writing to any timely submitted objections with an explanation for keeping or changing the proposed fee, charge, or assessment;
- **6.** Present any timely submitted objections and responses thereto to the City Council for its consideration, either before or during the public hearing;
- 7. All written objections must be submitted to the City Clerk by the end of public comment period at the hearing, that a failure to timely object in writing bars any right to challenge that fee, charge, or assessment in court, and that any such action will be limited to issues identified in such objections.

Council member Larry Hillberg expressed concern that even with the provisions in the ordinance for notifying ratepayers and property owners of impending changes to fees, some people might not hear in time to submit their objections. Following a brief discussion the item passed on a 4-0 vote.


