We ran out of beer and had to scramble for kegs. Three times. And no one wanted to leave.

One longtime resident summed it up perfectly, saying: "This is

the most alive I've ever seen Colfax."

That night wasn't just a concert, it was a statement. Colfax was ready for a comeback with music leadin the way.

### Rare Agenda Move By Council Rescues Rainbow Music

The October 22 Colfax city council meeting will be remembered by the full house in attendance as the night the council unanimously consented to move a closed session item to the open session agenda. The unexpected action was greeted with loud applause.

At issue was the lease held by Rainbow Music on the overland rail car at 99 Railroad Street. Rob and Christine Bonner, owners of the business for 40 years, recently received a letter from the city saying they would have to vacate the rail car when their lease expired on November 1.

"We didn't see this coming," Rob said. "We don't want to leave, but if we have to we'll need more time to shut down and move everything out."

The issue was originally agendized as a closed session negotiation between the city and the Bonners and, as usual, the public was given a chance to speak from the podium on the issue before the council adjourned behind a closed door.

But after 17 speakers spoke passionately in favor of extending the lease amid applause, laughter and tears, saying: "Renew the lease and keep the music alive", "The Bonners are a rare and wonderful part of Colfax", and "Rainbow Music is an incubator of creativity," council member Trinity Burruss lead the council to unanimously agree on moving the negotiation to the open session.

The city attorney introduced the item by reminding both parties that the negotiation would

focus on "price and terms of payment."

City manager Ron Walker apologised for "the breakdown in communication" with the Bonners, and said the city had no immediate plans for the rail car. He added that at some point the rail car would have to be vacated for a long overdue assessment of its overall condition.

Walker opened the discussion by verifying the accuracy of the formal request to extend the agreement through June 2026. Council member Larry Hillberg suggested a one-year extension, saying "Rainbow Music is probably the only 'destination' business in Colfax" and deserved more time to plan for moving out.

Council member Trinity Burruss agreed with Hillberg. "The city has no immediate plans for the rail car, it's not a safety problem and we have no idea of what fixing the rail car will entail," she said, before seconding Hillberg's suggestion.

Mayor Sean Lomen favored an eight-month extension, but just before 9:00 p.m. Burruss moved for a one-year extension, after which the lease would go on a month-by-month basis while the city figured out what to do with the rail car.

Her motion also contained a 90-day notice to cancel the lease by either party. The motion passed on a 5-0 vote and the meeting adjourned at 9:13 to a final round of applause.

Earlier in the meeting aenda,

the council:

- Unanimously approved a resolution granting a set-back variance for a 6,890 square foot exercise facility to be built at the corner of S. Auburn and E. Oak streets, across from the Catholic Church.
- Tabled a proposed resolution authorizing the city manager to develop a disposable foodware, convenience retail, and roadway impact fee ordinance aimed at reducing litter
- and other waste accumulating along streets, frontage roads and drainage systems. Local businesses contributing to that problem were opposed.
- Unanimously passed a resolution authorizing the city manager to request federal recognition of Colfax street addresses in its Address Management System, which currently does not due to the city's designation as a post-office-box-only delivery area.

• During good of the order council reports, council member Hillberg requested that the stalled Winterfest planning be put on the November 12 meeting agenda.

The October 8 Colfax city council meeting opened with all five members present. Subbing for the absent city clerk, the city attorney called the roll to get the meeting started.

The four-item consent calendar passed on a unanimous vote, and Agency Reports highlighted a report by Erin Newington on the successful "Pints and Grooves" music event the Colfax Historic Downtown Association put on in The Lot of Arts on October 4th. (see more on that event on page 1).

Public Comment had two speakers asking the council why Rainbow Music was being "booted" out of the overland rail car on Railroad Street. Mayor Sean Lomen denied that was happening and said the situation with Rainbow Music would be on the October 22 agenda.


The three items of city business opened with another discussion of how city donations made to non-profit organizations should be handled.

Council member Trinity Bur-

Coco's first came to Colfax as a vendor at the Farmers Market summer a year ago and then again this summer. They have a mobile cart that can easily travel to a variety of venues.

Coco's ice cream is all homemade and is dye-free and oh, so, tasty. Most of their candies are also homemade. Think fudge delicacies and chocolate specialities. Coco's also carries the line of Jelly Belly jelly beans that the previous owners carried and other commercial nonchocolate sugary treats.

The ice cream comes in many traditional flavors plus some exotic ones like Bailey's, Thai Tea and Strawberry Rhubarb. In the colder weather you will see soups added to the menu. The co-owners, Dave Mendoza and Barbara McDonald, also own a Coco's Ice Cream & Candy in Grass Valley at 2072 Ne-

vada City Hwy. and a Mexican restaurant Casa Las Katarina's in Alta Sierra. For more details on scheduling and prices for renting the space, call the community center office at 530-346-8726. Office hours are 9:00a.m. to 1:00p.m. M-W-F.




Proceeds from the event will support local Lions projects including student scholarships, elementary school literacy projects and vision services for needy individuals.

russ reiterated the suggestion she'd made several meetings ago that she favored setting up a separate non-profit for dealing with allocating city donations to other non-profit organizations.

Council member Caroline Mc-Cully voiced displeasure with an arrangement that would allow a separate organization to control taxpayer funds.

Council member Larry Hillberg teed up a lengthy list critiquing the city donation policy proposed by city staff, and agreed to send the city attorney and council members copies of the list.

When it looked like the discussion was stalled, Burruss suggested tabling the item and setting up a public workshop for more discussion. The rest of the council concurred, and the meeting moved on to the Winterfest planning report.

Hillberg immediately pointed out that the council had not seen a proposed budget for the event, saying they didn't have enough information to vote on anything yet. McCully and Burruss outlined a rough \$17,000-\$20,000 budget on the spot, which included \$12,000 for fireworks. That prompted Hillberg to ask where the money for the fireworks would come from, adding that it shouldn't be taken from the city's non-profit fund. Shortly after that the item was tabled to await a firmer budget that would include all funding sources.

That brought up the last item of business – paying \$15,000

for a city employee satisfaction survey to be done by an outside contractor. The council received one public comment from former mayor and former city employee, Tom Parnham, who suggested splitting the proposed fee among all city employees as a bonus and just asking them for their opinions. The council disagreed and voted unanimously for the item. At that point the council adjourned to a closed session for two items:

- A request to modify the settlement with Snapdragon Provisions, and
- A property negotiation with Dave Gard and Winner Chevrolet. There was no report out from the closed session.




