## Pioneer Community Energy Considering JPA Expansion

The October 28 meeting the Colfax City Council started with a presentation by Don Eckert, executive director of Pioneer Community Energy (Pioneer), regarding an opportunity to expand the original six-member Joint Powers Authority (JPA) to include Placerville and El Dorado County.

Pioneer is a Community Choice Aggregator (CCA) authorized by law to provide power for the communities it serves. Pioneer currently provides energy to more than 93,000 residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural customers in Colfax, Loomis, Auburn, Rocklin, Lincoln and unincorporated Placer County.

Eckert said that Pioneer had initiated an impact assessment study in August to determine if the proposed expansion would

be beneficial to all members of the JPA. If the study is favorable to expansion, the Pioneer board will request that the Colfax City Council support amending the JPA with a council resolution at a December council meeting.

"If the study is unfavorable we will suspend the process and reconsider it again next year," Eckert said.

Eckert predicted that expansion would be a win for all members. "Placerville and El Dorado County want stable, competitive energy rates without having to form their own CCA, when it will be much simpler to join one that has been working successfully for years."

Eckert said benefits from expansion to existing JPA members would include better pricing options for the larger JPA, and increased ability to pay down Pioneer's existing \$10 million

debt. "Paying that debt down faster will also be a factor in lowering customer rates as well," he said.





## Burn Days Are Back, With No Permits Required


After this Fall's first two good storm systems dumped nearly four inches of rain on the foothills in early November, CalFire closed the book on another wildfire season November 16.



Colfax, Alta Battalion Chief Brian Eagan confirmed that, saying: "You are allowed to burn without a permit as long as it is a burn day."

All safety restrictions are still in effect and CalFire reminds us that fires burn hotter and cleaner when piles are kept dry before lighting them.

So, what is Colfax Market: a grocery store, a grocery store plus, a convenience store, a small department store? All the above! Facebook lists it as a Convenience Store.

The Market sells groceries; liquor, including a nice variety of California wines and local beers; fishing and hunting licenses; fishing tackle; dog and cat food and toys; toys for children; shoes; Lottery tickets and more.

As for services the store provides, the Market cashes payroll checks; has an ATM, and a fax and copy machine (copies 15c a page).

# Find Out If A Permit Is Needed Before Starting A Building Project

I am often asked why we have building codes and why it is necessary to have a building permit when making changes to a residence or business.

The Babylonian King, Hammurabi, published what could be considered the first building code almost 4,000 years ago. Not following the code often resulted in severe penalties.

They included the loss of property, silver or life. For example, code #229 stated that “if a builder has built a house for a man, and the work is not sound and the house has fallen, the builder would be put to death.” Code #230 states that “if the owner’s son is killed, the builder’s son shall be put to death.”



Modern codes require permits and while there are a few projects that do not require building permits, most do. They are required by law for the protection of life and property per the California Building Code:

“1.1.2 Purpose. The purpose of this code is to establish the minimum requirements to safeguard the public health, safety and general welfare through structural strength, means of egress facilities, stability, access to persons with disabilities, sanitation, adequate lighting and ventilation and energy conservation; safety of life and property from fire and other hazards attributed to the built environment; and to provide safety to fire fighters and emergency responders during emergency operations.”

The benefit of obtaining a permit prior to starting a project is to insure all of the work is safe and up to current code guidelines. It also protects property owners from certain liabilities. Should you wish to sell the property, it also provides proof that any improvements made were completed and to code.

The city’s goal is to help the citizens of Colfax be safe. Give us a call before starting a project to ask if a permit is required.
