Proposed Vaccine Mandate Tabled By PMVCD Board

The Placer Mosquito and Vector Control District (PMVCD) board of trustees sidestepped adopting a resolution mandating COVID vaccinations for all District staff at its Nov. 15 monthly meeting.

The policy would have required that all District employees be fully vaccinated for COVID-19, or have an approved exemption, before January 17, 2021. Employees failing to meet one of those conditions by the dead-

line would be terminated. District general manager Joel Buettner brought the resolution to the board after learning that fewer than 50 percent of his staff is currently vaccinated. The meeting lasted two hours and all of the unvaccinated District staff made public comments.

In a cover letter to the draft vaccination mandate policy that was sent to all District employees, Buettner said: “Currently, the District has fewer than

one-half of its employees vaccinated, and has experienced multiple COVID-19 cases since the beginning of the pandemic.

“When employees get infected or sick, not only does it create a serious risk to them, but it also prevents the District from performing its essential services for the public. The best way to minimize this safety hazard is to require all employees to be vaccinated for COVID-19.”

With only five of the seven board members present, when three of them voiced their preference to try and figure out a less severe policy, the resolution was tabled.

As we head toward the holiday season it is always good to reflect on how very much we in Placer County have to be grateful for, especially during the challenges of the last year!


Please join me in thanking those who have done so much to contribute to our safety and well-being during the year.


Our many incredible non-profits. These organi-

Placer Recall Election Turnout 14% Higher Than State Average

Following September's Recall election of Governor Gavin Newsom, there's still a lot of misinformation out there regarding the fairness, transparency and accuracy of the election process both in Placer County and around the country in general.

Placer County Election Registrar/Recorder, Ryan Ronco, gave a 15-minute presentation to the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, 11/16/21 regarding voter turnout and election processes for the September's gubernatorial recall election.

Among the points that Ronco made:

- When the election began Placer County had 277,363 registered voters.

- That made Placer the eighteenth largest election jurisdiction in California.



- 201,661 Placer voters cast ballots, which represented a 72.7% turnout and the sixth largest turnout in California in 2021.

- Placer County voter turnouts routinely run 10-15 points higher than state average.

- For September's recall, Placer's 58.5% was 14% higher than the state average.

- After careful counting and recounting, the numbers showed that 57.4% of Placer voters voted in favor of recalling Governor Gavin Newsom, and 42.6% were opposed to doing so.


