

Council Looks Ahead To the November 2022 Election

Beginning preparations for the coming November 8 election was the sole item of business at the May 25 meeting of the Colfax city council.

Mayor Pro Tem Mendoza was absent.

On a unanimous 4-0 vote, the council passed a three-part resolution that would:

• Give notice of the November 8, 2022 General Municipal Election, requesting consolidation of that election with the statewide general election, and requesting services from the Placer County Clerk with respect to that election. • Give notice of City Officer Elections, prompted by the expiration of terms of three city council members: Trinity Burruss, Joe Fatula and Sean Lomen. City clerk Marguerite Bailey said that filing dates for new candidates would open on July 18 and close on August 12. Incumbent council members will have until August 17 to file their papers. She said that Placer County would also host a candidate workshop on July 23.

• Propose a ballot measure to adopt Ordinance 548 amending the Colfax Municipal Code to charge a Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) on all persons receiving TOT revenue, and increasing

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CAL FIRE Suspends Burn Permits In Nevada, Yuba and Placer Counties

Due to the increasing fire danger posed by dead grass and hotter, drier conditions in the Sierra foothills region, CAL FIRE suspended all burn permits for outdoor residential burning of landscape debris such as branches and leaves, within the State Responsibility Area of Nevada, Yuba and Placer and Counties effective Monday, May 23, 2022.

We are already into the fire season with increased debris burn escapes and while wildfires are a natural part of California's landscape, the fire season in California and across the west is starting earlier and ending later each year.

"California wildfires continue to threaten our communities," said Chief Joe Tyler, CAL FIRE Director. "With the conditions set for an early start of the 2022 fire season, it is imperative that we collectively take preventative steps now to prepare, and we ask all Californians to do their part in wildfire preparedness."

Kicking Off Summer

It has been a busy few months and Colfax is getting ready to head into the summer season. I know one of the top concerns on all of our minds is the imminent risk of wildfire. Although we were lucky to get a couple good storms recently, we are still on high alert given the hot dry conditions to come. Now, more than ever, it's time for us to be proactive and ready.

I had the privilege earlier this month of visiting Washington, DC on the 50th annual Cap-To-Cap delegation trip. This was an opportunity for leaders from all over our capital region to advocate for the needs of our communities at the federal level.

I was assigned to the Air Quality Team with the sub-group specializing on Wildfire threat. We met with the offices for the US Forest Service, EPA, House Committee on Climate Crisis, and many representatives who have the influence to foster the critical changes we need. I was thrilled that all of our meetings were not only productive, but the staff we worked with was engaged and passionate. Specific action was taken from each meeting, and if you have ever had experience in government advocacy, you know how hard this can be to come by. I was even pleasantly surprised when I was introduced in a meeting to the legislative director for a congressional office outside of our area, and he not only knew where Colfax was, but was a Colfax High School graduate!

One of the biggest benefits to a trip like this is the fact that over 300 regional leaders are given a platform to network and collaborate in ways that don't organically present themselves on a regular basis. I spent a significant amount of time over the course of six days taking every opportunity I could to learn from other jurisdictions and find ways we can establish and foster ongoing healthy relation-ships.

As a small town it is so important for us to find common ground with our neighbors, and to advocate as a team for the needs of our people. We need to be willing and prepared to show up to battle of behalf of others if we want them to come to our aid.

This is especially important as we look at the impacts of state level policies going into place without regard for the implementation issues posed to rural California. We win as a team, or we lose as a team, so we need to work together to forge the road instead of letting Sacra-

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the TOT rate from 8% to 10%. The two percent raise would bring an estimated \$29,000 to the city's general fund.

A 2/3 vote by the council was required to place the TOT Measure on the ballot. A majority of the electoral vote in November is required to increase and expand the Transient Occupancy Tax.

Earlier in the meeting the council voted 4-0 to extend its rental agreement with Rainbow Music for use of the Overland Railcar at 99 Railroad Ave in Colfax. The extension will run until June 2023. The agreement also offers the potential of a partial reduction in the rent in trade for repair and replacement of 12 custom windows in the railcar.

At its meeting on May 11, the council passed the second reading of Ordinance 547, "Limitations On Number Of Animals" (Chickens) on a 4-1 vote, with Mayor Burruss dissenting. The ordinance takes effect 30 days after adoption (June 10, 2022). As there was no other council business, the meeting adjourned 30 minutes after the opening gavel.

City Council meetings in June are scheduled for the 8th and 22nd.

Thinking of going solar? I have a suggestion: **DC Solar Electric Inc**. right here in Colfax at 333 Canyon Court, just off Canyon Way.

Derek and Chasin met in grade school. Later they were roommates in college. Now they work together everyday, and they are still buddies.

DC Solar believes in giving back. As a result, they have sponsored sports teams, Colfax High School projects and community projects. They will have a grand opening celebration during the Colfax July 3rd festivities next month.
